Fibromyalgia, a multiaxial approach.

Fibromyalgia is a common condition, affecting almost as many people as diabetes. Unlike diabetes, however, it is quite poorly understood and is often very poorly managed. In this lecture, we examine what Fibromyalgia is, what it isn't, how it can be managed, and what role Podiatrists and FHP's can play in helping patients with this condition.

Pulsed radiofrequency energy (PRFE) – a little known gem in the armoury of physical therapies for MSK management?

Radiofrequency energy treatment has been used for some decades in the management of musculoskeletal (MSK) pain. More recently, devices have become miniaturised, portable and available in the UK as an over-the-counter (OTC) 'topical' analgesic for localized MSK pain and injury (ActiPatch® BioElectronics Corporation, MD, USA).

As an acute muscle pain treatment, the ActiPatch device has been demonstrated to significantly reduce postoperative pain and the requirement for narcotic pain medications in submuscular breast augmentation patients. In two chronic musculoskeletal pain conditions, plantar fasciitis and osteoarthritis of the knee, the device was also found to significantly reduce pain and medication use.

This lecture will review the efficacy, safety and cost effectiveness of this form of physical therapy to assist practitioners in decision making on the use of this treatment for their patients.

This lecture intends to give some insights into the experience of common mental health conditions and how this might impact on engagement with treatments.

Dermatology of the Lower Limb in the Older Patient

In Britain, 7 in 10 older people have a skin condition, ranging from the itchy infection of scabies and eczema to life-threatening skin malignancies. Yet curiously, evidence shows that people are more likely to wear sunscreen if they are told it slows down skin-ageing than for preventing skin cancer. Skin ages with us, telling our story, for better or worse. At the end of this presentation, attendees should be able to define cutaneous changes in the older person and identify the associated risk factors. Person-centred care and management packages for the prevention of common skin disorders will be considered, along with recognising when and where to refer patients with suspicious lesions to dermatology specialists.

The role of the private foot practitioner in managing patients with diabetes and peripheral arterial disease

Podiatry as a profession faces challenging times with recruitment and retention, and the NHS is having to tighten referral/access criteria. With more demand from an ageing population and more health conditions, the role of the private practitioner has never been more important to support and provide alternative foot care treatments. It is therefore important that private practitioners treating people with moderate or higher risk diabetes understand and recognise all aspects of diabetic foot disease.

The clinician/client bond: therapeutic relationship or unhealthy attachment?

This lecture aims to explore the nature of the therapeutic relationship between the clinician and the person receiving care or treatment. Sometimes a brief and discrete episode, but more often relationships spanning many months or years as the foot health clinician works with a population with long-term conditions and/or advancing years. The connection formed may end with treatment completion or it may end more sadly with the death of the client. During this session, we will consider how that therapeutic relationship can be nurtured, developed, or challenged, particularly in terms of closure. The reality of client death will also be touched upon, preparing us for the inevitable or sometimes unexpected outcome.

The Validity and Reliability of the SINBAD classification tool for Diabetic Foot Ulcers

This lecture explores the importance of having a validated tool to assess Diabetic Foot Ulcers and its value to all practitioners – from those who use it to refer on appropriately, to those who use it to guide their management plans. This focuses ones critical thinking skills and helps them to recognise the crucial remit transition between a Foot Health Professional and a Podiatrist.
